The area of the Society's interest defined by the Society as the neighbourhood of Earl's Court, based on the original Earl's Manorial Lands, is from Kensington High Street in the north to Fulham Road in the south and from the West London Railway Line in the west to cover Courtfield, Ashburnham and Lexham Gardens. to the east, without defined borders.
