CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2022-2023

DEAR RESIDENTS

n New Years Day we received some very sad news. Christine Powell, our Membership Secretary and ex-chair of ECSRA, has passed away after a short illness. Christine who lived in the Square for 45 years was a member of ECSRA's Executive Committee for many years and will be greatly missed. We send our sincere condolences to her family.



As we gradually recovered and learned to live with Covid, the importance of COMMUNITY has become paramount. As a Residents' Association, our focus remains on ways to enable community cohesion within the Earl's Court Square Conservation Area. Our catchment covers around 650 households and our aim for this year is to increase our membership.

Membership of ECSRA now costs £10 (individual) and £15 (family/household) and enables us to fund refreshments and music at our events such as the magical "Lighting of the Christmas Tree", our AGM with complimentary wine and canapés and the DJ at our annual summer family BBQ/Disco. All our residents are welcome at these events. However, they all need funding and ECSRA membership fees provides this - so please make 2023 the year when the majority of the 650 households in our area join ECSRA - so we can continue providing events for our community.

EVENTS:

During 2022 ECSRA hosted 6 events – some of which were shared with the Garden Sub-Committee. Our AGM in February, held at The Bolton Pub, started the ball rolling with our guest speaker, The Mayor of Kensington and Chelsea, Cllr Gerard Hargreaves, who brought along his splendid regalia to illustrate his talk on the role of the Mayor.

Then in March, Christine Powell and Sue Lupton led a "History of the Square Walk" - when we all learned something new about the Square in which we live. (See https://ecsra.co.uk/events/ on our website for their notes on the walk). During June we celebrated The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in the Garden with a brass band and a magnificent array of food - contributed by residents - whilst Katrina Quinton provided endless cups of tea/coffee in her eclectic collection of china teacups.

We held our annual BBQ/Disco in July which was not as well attended as we hoped so we have moved the date to Saturday 24 June 2023 to catch residents before they depart for their summer holidays - as this event is our main fundraiser.



We held an "Oktoberfest" in The Bottlery for ECSRA Members and their guests and we're back at The Bottlery on 17 October 2023 for a Members' New Orleans Jazz Evening. Our final event was, of course, "The Lighting of the Christmas Tree" in December. It's magical to see so many neighbours of all ages celebrating the festive season together, consuming Alan Malcolm's legendary gallons of mulled wine, Katrina Quinton's 100 "yummy" home-made mince pies and Mariaclara's delicious home-made cookies.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR (ASB):

Increased levels of ASB are the main concern in Earl's Court Square. Most buildings have been affected by people squatting on door-steps – using/buying/ dealing drugs - and there are an increasing number of residents who are concerned about the increase in shoplifting on Earl's Court Road and scared to walk on our streets.

During 2022 ECSRA actively lobbied for more "bobbies on the beat" and co-authored an ASB Petition in 2021 (supported by 1000+ residents) drawing attention to the increased levels of crime in the area.


Our Councillors, led by the late Cllr. Malcolm Spalding, spearheaded a Callto-Action which was presented to RBKC, who finally accepted that Earl's Court should be treated as a priority area, even though this was not reflected in recorded crime.

In response to the Call-to-Action, RBKC funded a month of action with the Borough Police last December resulting in:

- Additional patrols from police, wardens and other council officers to crack down on ASB.
- RBKC conducting a series of street briefings, with Safer Neighbourhood

Police Officers - talking to residents about their concerns - to help them formulate a sustainable plan to tackle the issues affecting Earl's Court (highlighted in the Call-to-Action) as part of a "Creating Safer Neighbourhoods" programme.



We would ask all our residents to report crime, ASB and drug related activity online to the Police on: https://www.met.police.uk/ro/report/ocr/af/how-to-report-a-crime/ or by calling 101 so the police data will more accurately reflect the levels of crime we are all experiencing which, we hope, will lead to increased policing.

Please always call 999 in an emergency.

ECSRA's Executive Committee recently viewed a presentation by a private security company, whose mobile units would liaise closely with the Police, RBKC and local community.

When encountering drug dealing they would intervene, seize drugs and restrain culprits in a professional manner until the Police arrive - which is all recorded on bodycams and documented.

Although there are advantages, it was felt that costs would be prohibitive (as not all the buildings would be able or willing to contribute) and we are discussing whether the area covered could be increased to include other Garden Squares within Earl's

Court to reduce costs. Please email me with your thoughts on this proposal or if you would like to see estimated costs:

CYCLE HANGAR:

Despite some initial opposition, the cycle hangar located in the NE arm of the Square is filled with 6 cycles and has not been vandalised so we are now in discussions with RBKC about the location of an additional cycle hangar (our preferred location is within the NW arm)for which we would again apply for RBKC/NCIL funding. There are a growing number of residents on the Council's waiting list who are looking for a secure space for their cycles.

PLANTERS IN THE SE ARM:

The planters have been effective in blocking cycles and motorbikes from using the pavements to access Earl's Court Road which was dangerous for pedestrians but, due to inclement weather when they were initially planted, the plants have not grown to the height anticipated. We will continue to monitor them and we hope they improve and flourish in 2023.

ECSRA has installed and funded a standpipe to aid watering and added spikes on the planters' edges to discourage people using them as seats and damaging the plants.

FAÇADE RULES:

After considerable work by the Residents' Association the Square was granted full Conservation Area status by the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea in 1975. One of its stipulations is that the buildings on the west, north and east sides *must be* painted Magnolia BS4800 08B15 with woodwork in white

but the colour of front doors is at the owners' choice. The colour for the house numbers is Black and the typeface is Garamond, 7 inches in height.



The latter detail is not in the Conservation Area document but is something ECSRA recommended. Please keep our Square looking beautiful by advising your Managing Agents/Housing Association when they are re-decorating buildings that the Façade Rules are on our website https://ecsra.co.uk/facade-rules/

EARL'S COURT SOCIETY SURVEY:

The Earl's Court Society would welcome residents' views on the future of Earl's Court and particularly on The Earl's Court Development on the old exhibition site. Please do complete this survey on their website as they will be representing residents' views to the Council:

SCHOOL TRAVEL PLAN:

Residents have been concerned about parents double-parking at school drop-off/collection times and parents waiting for children who block the pavements. Langham Mansions has particularly been affected by children dropping litter on their steps and climbing on railings.

ECSRA arranged a meeting with RBKC/ School/Residents and we are awaiting finalisation of a "School Travel Plan" which we hope will address residents' concerns.

We've also asked for signage to be amended to prohibit parking/stopping outside the school with increased times to cover longer school hours and for prominent "One Way" signs in the SW arm to prevent cars using this as an exit onto Warwick Road. I recently met with the School's new Chair of Governors and we hope that the problems in the SW arm can be resolved with a closer working relationship between the School and residents (represented by ECSRA).

BUILT-OUT BUS STOPS ON EARL'S COURT ROAD.

ECSRA has been campaigning for the removal of the built-out bus stops on safety/pollution grounds.

We are also seriously concerned about the impact on the emergency services of TfL's bureaucratic decision to retain them, which could well be life-threatening, and we have written to TfL and our London Assembly Member, Tony Devenish, highlighting our concerns and questioning their decision to maintain them under Freedom of Information.

We await TfL's response which I'll report at the AGM.



ECSRA AGM

We invited Cllr. Gerard Hargreaves, the Mayor of the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea (RBKC) to speak at our AGM in February 2022.

He chose to give a fascinating account of the history of the Mayoral role and regalia, aided by Mr. Rush the dedicated chauffeur. Cllr Hargreaves explained the



Mayor is the legal entity of the Borough. Every May there is a new Mayor chosen. It is a ceremonial post with the Mayor performing around 400 engagements in the year, including visiting schools, charities and community occasions in the Borough. There are eight Council meetings in the year's tenure and three fundraising receptions for the Mayor's chosen charity. The Mayor leads the Borough on Remembrance Sunday.

The Mayor also spends the day at the annual Chelsea Flower Show and meets the Royal Family and liaises with the many Ambassadors and Embassies in the Kensington area.



RBKC is a Royal Borough, as Kensington Palace was the home to Queen Victoria. On her death, she decreed an ORB to The Lords of the Manor. This Mace is hugely symbolic and goes back to 1901. Kensington is the oldest Lords

CHRISTINE POWELL a Celebration of Life 1945 - 2023

hristine Powell, who has sadly died over the New Year, was a stalwart of the Earl's Court Square Residents' Association (ECSRA) from the time she arrived in the Square in 1977 until her death. Her commitment, organisation skills, attention to detail and hard work all honed during her career as a statistician for the UK Atomic Energy Authority and BAA made her a valuable asset for the development of the Association.

For ten years she was Chair of the Association, and successfully applied for the Gold Standard Award that was given to the RA by RBKC. She headed up organising the wonderful 40th anniversary of ECSRA celebrations in the Poets' House, obtained CLLL funding for the plaques to recognise four notable individuals who had lived in the Square, and most recently, wrote up and took people on a history walk of Earl's Court Square. After retiring as ECSRA Chairman she became Membership Secretary and remained on the Executive Committee. In the wider Earl's Court, for many years Christine served on the Environment Committee



of the Earl's Court Society and represented the ECSRA on many events. She served on an RBKC committee seeking to find jobs for young people and represented ECSRA at the Kensington Society.

Christine kept quiet her short battle with cancer, serving minced pies to residents at the December Christmas tree lighting event. Music was Christine's great love. She played the violin in the highly regarded Brent Symphony Orchestra. For many years she was a volunteer host with Opera Holland Park, greeting guests with her warm smile. She

encouraged Earl's Court residents to join her at OHP operas, always with chocolates at the interval. Christine also enjoyed playing bridge and tending her flowers on her balcony. It was known not to call Christine when The Archers was on the radio. Earl's Court Square and the wider Kensington community have lost a great friend and neighbour as well as a valuable community asset. As Alex Tullett said, "If you knew Christine as a friend, that's all you needed to know."

Christine is survived by three elder sisters and nephews and nieces.

A Dedicated Community Champian

hat a shock to hear of Malcolm's passing in March last year. At our ECSRA 2022 AGM a month before, he was on top of his game - well informed, advising residents of actions taken by the Council, listening and always working with tireless energy making Earl's Court a better place to live.

Malcolm's role as a local RBKC Councillor was tremendously important to him. But the most important thing for Malcolm was representing Earl's Court – his community, his neighbourhood and the area of London which he had cherished and called his home for many years and which he always championed.

I have lived in Earl's Court for 30 years and known Malcolm through the Earl's Court Business Forum, then the Kensington & Chelsea Chamber of Commerce and more so since he became our Earl's Court Councillor in 2014. Many of us haven't known Earl's Court without Malcolm! Always kind and a force for good.

Malcolm went out on a high, having two days earlier given one of the best presentations of his life at the Council's Overview and Scrutiny Committee, in the form of a Councillors' Call-to-Action. This was a comprehensive plan to deal with the root causes of issues in the Earl's Court area. The plan gained unanimous support and has been

passed to the Leadership Team, with the recommendation that it be implemented in full.

ENVIRONMENT REPORT

local group has been set up with particular attention to the environment within the Earl's Court ward.

The following are some of the issues reviewed this year:

- It was disappointing that not sufficient residents came forward to 'Green for the Jubilee' by erecting window boxes along the railings of their property. However, there are discussions about green panels being planted along West Cromwell Road as well as new planting on the central reservation.
- Air monitoring units have been installed on Old Brompton Road near Bousfield School and on

Warwick Road near St Cuthbert with St Matthias School.

- It has been reported that pollution is lower when the wind is from the west / north. Introducing electric vehicles is only partly beneficial in reducing pollution as some particulates are as a result of the rubber from tyres.
- O Data gathered by a satellite company over the past three years, has shown that communal gardens, over 100 square meters, show the cooling effect offered. This is because the trees, grass and shrubs provide shade, move water from the garden into the atmosphere and deflect radiation from the sun.

GARDEN NEWS - Katrina Quinton, Chairman Garden Sub-Committee




s I sit down to write this, the Christmas tree has just been lit up and carols sung and mulled wine drunk and another gentle and happy event in the garden has come and gone. The garden really is a focal point for the whole community – not just the keyholders and subscribers but for everyone who passes by and passes through the square. The fact that we can enjoy it with our neighbours makes this privilege even more special.

During the year the garden has continued to provide a source of respite – no longer the only refuge of green space and open air available thankfully. As the whole world has breathed a little more easily so has the garden with slightly fewer demands on it – and then we had no rain! We watered for as long as we could and then when Thames Water asked us to stop we did. Thankfully it then started to rain a bit which helped the planting dramatically but only time will tell how the trees will have been affected. Some of our trees are reaching the end of their natural lifespan namely the Pride of India trees at each end of the garden which were planted about 50 years ago. We will wait and see if they recover but there may well be a need to dig them out and consider what we do next in those flower beds. They are such attractive trees that they will be definitely a tough act to follow!

We have been in touch with the RBKC arboriculturist and I did laugh as I ambled back home from the post office one day to be rather surprised by a bellowing bicyclist who did say, "I've been watching it all year Katrina; let's give it to the spring to see what happens." It did take me a moment to realise it was James the treeman – so I refer you back to my first paragraph which just goes to show that our garden gives pleasure to those who pass by!

The glories of the Chelsea Flower Show returned in May which meant that I too returned to the annual torture of deciding which tulips to buy. 1 | Defibrillator: Now available 24/7at Krystals at 322-324 Earl's Court Road. It is visible and yellow in colour, behind the main counter on the right when you go into the shop. It will only work if it detects that it needs to be used, instructions are by voice in English. ECSRA was instrumental in obtaining

the grant from London Hearts towards its installation which was funded by Krystals.

2 | EV Drivers: EV drivers who need to use public charging points are asking for VAT on these charging points (currently 20%) to be brought into line with domestic electricity rates (currently 5%). In RBKC fewer than 10% of EV drivers have off street parking which is needed for a home charging point. With the cost of electricity at public charging points already soaring above domestic tariffs, drivers are starting to question the benefit of driving on electricity, especially those who have plug-in hybrids.

3 | Double Glazing in the Conservation Area: If residents wish to replace traditional windows with double glazed versions that look the same (e.g. white painted wooden sash of the same visual design), the Council has waived the need for planning permission – for people who live in houses. The Leadership Team is now actively working on making things easier for flat owners to do the same, with a simple process. The Council is also currently consulting on making double glazing easier for some listed buildings (via planningconsult.rbkc.gov.uk ending 9th January)

4 | Anti-Social Behaviour: The Council's Leadership Team, working alongside Kensington MP Felicity Buchan, has responded to the late Cllr Malcolm Spalding's "Councillors'-Call-to-Action" and has put together a comprehensive Action Plan for Earl's Court. Cllr Cem Kemahli has been appointed to lead an Earl's Court Task Force to drive through three stages of actions and improvements to reduce levels of crime and ASB as well as smartening up and boosting the Earl's Court area.
